This line describes how the soldiers gave up their lives and their future potential. The metaphor of wine suggests vitality and beauty.

"Honour has come back, as a king, to earth"

The poet imagines that the soldiers' sacrifice has restored a sense of honor and nobility to the world. "And we have come into our heritage"

Brooke concludes that the living have inherited values like holiness, love, and nobility because of the soldiers' sacrifices.
